
Virtual Graduate Reception – For current students

About the 2022 Lecture

Building on W. E. B. Du Bois's concept of the color line, Diamond's lecture will highlight how white supremacy is deeply embedded in U.S. educational organizations and the ways that opportunity hoarding helps sustain it. In doing so, he will shift the intellectual gaze from the aspirational progress narratives often associated with *Brown* to the racial hierarchies and various forms of harm that schools (even integrated ones) continue to reproduce. Taking the recent attacks against critical race theory as a backdrop, Diamond will argue that schools not only contribute to educational inequity but are race-making institutions that socialize people into relations of racial domination and subordination through institutional practices and individual actions. The Guest Editors, as scholars geographically and epistemically located in the Global South, invite academics and practitioners to submit proposals that scrutinize, reflect, and problematize Internationalization of Higher Education from decolonial critiques. Proposals should address narratives that contribute to naturalizing or hiding power asymmetries and colonial hierarchies among countries, institutions, peoples, languages, and knowledge systems in processes of IHE. Submissions must focus on projects, politics, and practices enacted in academic spaces as a form of resistance and re-existence to modernity/coloniality, expanding the dialogues among Southern epistemologies that fight the effects of coloniality, produce critique, and reconceptualize international education otherwise.
