Jayden Rameikas '22, a transgender man from Oakville, Connecticut. He was the first transgender student to come out at his high school and often felt isolated prior to coming to college. He is a double major in political science and entrepreneurial studies. He is the Student Government Association chief of staff, a 2019 Orientation leader, and a resident facility assistant (RFA).



Fred Colon, vice president, chief diversity officer and head of organization effectiveness at Travelers Insurance. As a Hispanic gay male, he is committed to advancing diversity and inclusion as a business imperative. Under Colon's leadership, Travelers was named one of America's Best **Employers for** Diversity by Forbes in 2019 and has been recognized six consecutive years by DiversityInc for its diverse and inclusive culture. Colon is a member of the University President's Community Advisory Council.



Robin McHaelen. founder and executive director of True Colors, Inc. a nonprofit organization that works with social service agencies, schools, organizations, and within communities to ensure that the needs of sexual and gender minority youth are both recognized and competently met. The organization trains more than 6,000 people annually, organizes the largest LGBT youth conference in the country with more than 3,000 attendees, and manages the state's only LGBT mentoring program.



Mildred McNeill. executive director of marketing and communication at UHart. At NBC30, she became the first African American female television news director in the country and won two regional Emmy Awards. A native of the pre-Civil Rights Act South, she also has held communication positions at WGN, WTNH, the state treasurer's office, the state's largest teacher's union, and United Way of Central and Northeastern Connecticut. McNeill is a member of the University President's Community Advisory Council.
