

## **Mike Kaselouskas: Director for the North Atlantic**

Mike Kaselouskas has more than 30 years of public safety experience, starting as an auxiliary police officer for the town of Enfield, Connecticut. He later assisted new recruits for the auxiliary unit in firearm training. In 1993, Kaselouskas joined the Department of Public Safety at the University of Hartford and was promoted to Chief in 2018. He sits on several boards and committees for the university, as well as for outside associations and executive boards.

Kaselouskas has trained fellow instructors in the areas of handcuffing, OC pepper spray, and police domestic violence through the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center. He is also a certified instructor of Fair & Impartial Policing, Domestic Violence, the Monadnock Expandable Baton, PR-24 Baton, Management of Aggressive Behavior, Empower the Girls Training, Rape Aggression Defense, laser radar, motor vehicle stops, sexual assault investigations, and critical incident command.

Additionally, Kaselouskas takes special interest in active shooter training and gives presentations for the public, as well as for law enforcement, and has sat on expert panels regarding the subject. He also teaches recruits annually in defensive tactics, use of force, and search & seizure. He wrote and instructed an 80-hour police curriculum which is held annually and attended by the University of Hartford officers, as well as other outside agencies and police departments.

Kaselouskas has testified as an expert witness in a court case regarding police training and was awarded by Connecticut Sexual Assault Crisis Services for his dedication to the community and law enforcement in personal safety. He was also recently recognized by Mothers Against Drunk Driving with the Judge Philip Mancini award for his dedication to this cause and community service.

Currently the president of the Connecticut chapter of the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators (IACLEA), Kaselouskas is also a member of the International Law Enforcement Educators and Trainers Association (ILEETA), Narcotic Enforcement Officers Association (NEOA), New England State Police Network, (ATAP) Association of Threat Assessment Professionals, Empower the Girls Instructor Team, Rape Aggression Defense Systems, (NaBITA) National Behavioral Intervention Team Association, and the International Police Mountain Bike Association.
