He is a published scholar with articles on social and political participation by African Americans, election reforms in Connecticut, minor political parties in contemporary American politics, and public attitudes toward quality and integrated education in Connecticut. He has authored or co-authored public opinion pieces published in a range of newspapers in Connecticut. As an engaged community leader,
